Re. short visit to Ruamahanga River terrace north of Gladstone.

After the discovery of a lone Pittosporum obcordatum at the Ruamahanga River terrace (T26.338.164) I visited some landowners to the north of the site on 18.10.1996. I talked to a Mr Hayes, who gave me the names and phone numbers of his neighbours (see sketch). I also spent approx. one hour looking at the vegetation on the river terrace, and made a plant list for the site. I did not find P. obcordatum in the searched area, but noticed a number of Coprosma spp that may need a closer/expert look.

I searched a few 100m of river terrace on Mr Hayes and Tim Burn's properties (see map). Mr Burns has planted several 100 native trees on his property in recent years. There is little understorey at present, presumably as a result of grazing. Mr Burn's property is no longer being grazed and native vegetation has started to regenerate.
